## 4<sup>th</sup> Global Youth Forum 2012 (GYF 2012) Programme for Foreign Delegates

The effect of globalisation on individual nations, cultures and societies has been nothing short of extraordinary. In the years preceding the current economic challenges, Singapore has taken pride in preparing her youths well for the global age by providing them with solid academic foundations and challenging them to think beyond Singapore. As former Minister for Education and current Minister for Finance Mr. Tharman Shanmugaratnam pointed out in his speech at the MOE Teaching Scholarships Award Ceremony 2007:

"We face the challenge of preparing our students for an ever-changing world. [...] We must prepare our young to think for themselves [...] respond confidently to problems as they come up [...] instil in them a curiosity about the wider world"

"Media and globalisation are closely linked. First of all, the media are one of the means by which we all experience globalisation [...] Globalisation is speeding up the fundamental technological change that we are seeing in the media world, and it allows new ideas and technological innovation to spread around the globe. [...] Globalisation [...] opens the world to new ideas and for innovation."
